## A Message From Our Honorees Merle & Mort Kane

At the top of our list of values and priorities are those of the JCC and also of Torah: building a strong Jewish community, bringing people together, creating relationships with the community and to each other. That is the goal of the Sabes JCC, the Jewish community's home. It is in a unique position to do this and it does it very well. With our collective



support, the JCC will help ensure the vitality of our very special Jewish community.

Our other interests include education, especially Jewish learning. We have a scholarship program for continuing education for teachers of Judaism, support Herzl Camp, Talmud Torah, and the Jewish day school and, for me personally, Jewish learning has been especially important. Other priorities include feeding the hungry, especially through Mazon: The Jewish Response to Hunger and Second Harvest Heartland, one of the nation's premier and most efficient food banks; human rights, including Jewish Community Action in our community; protecting the environment, including the Environmental Defense Fund; and international aid, including the American Jewish World Service.

The JCC promotes many of these same values, including education in the broadest sense, programs that bring us all together, including the Jewish Film and Humor Festivals, lectures, plays, and art exhibits. It provides meals for seniors. The JCC includes people of all denominations and orientations; provides for people with challenges; is environmentally aware; and, last but certainly not least for us, promotes health and fitness.

There are two questions to consider: "Why give and how much to give?"

Among the reasons and near the top of the "Why to Give?" list is, perhaps selfishly, that it feels very good to give, to support causes and organizations that you care about, that are meaningful to you, and that give added purpose to your life. It is a gift to them, but, as much, giving is a gift to you.

"How much to give?" is very personal—how much each of us has, but, and possibly most importantly, how much is enough for us, and how much to share?
